

Overcoming the Budget Squeeze




- Develop medical center support

 - Research tracks
 - Education tracks
 - Conference attendance and travel
 - Additional training
 - DEI initiatives
 - Wellness events
 - Salaries
- Philanthropic support (eg endowed chairs, education gifts)

Support From External Training Programs

- NIH programs eg R25, T32
- State-funded programs eg CIRM
- Profession Association Grants eg ABF, AAN, ANA
- Professional Association Travel Awards eg ANA, AAN
- Foundations
- Pharma, biotech unrestricted educational awards
