My name is Gauri Pawar and I am the Vice Chair for Education and Residency Program Director at West Virginia University School of Medicine. Medical education is my passion and I have had multiple opportunities to pursue my passion.

Residency In-service Training Examination (RITE) Advisory Panel of the AAN was the launch pad of my career. I joined the panel as a member in 2005. I became the Chair of that panel for three two-year terms, ending in 2017. It was one of the most gratifying experiences of my career. It also gave me an opportunity to serve on the AAN's Graduate Education Subcommittee and Examination Subcommittee. I currently serve as a member of the NeuroSAE/Question of the day workgroup and eLearning subcommittee for the AAN since October 2018.

My enthusiasm for teaching and education has been recognized by learners and I have received five "Resident Teaching Awards". Recently, I was humbled to be recognized on a larger scale by receiving the 2020 AAN "Program Director Recognition Award".

I have been involved in mentoring many medical students over the years to pursue a career in neurology. As the only female full professor in our department, I take pride in listening and mentoring all faculty who seek my advice and serve as a role model for junior faculty within our department and at our institution.
